Follow Your Passion

On May 23, we will join together with Christian communities around the world to celebrate Pentecost Sunday. Pentecost is the Sunday when we remember the coming of the Holy Spirit. Many also think of it as the beginning of the church.

Each year I like to use Pentecost as a way of inviting individuals not only to think about where the church has come over the years – but where we might be going as well. One of my hopes for the church in this new millennium is that it will find ways of moving away from institutional ways of being toward more organic ways of being. My hope is that we'll move away from seeing church as a place where people are plugged into places that fit the institution's needs toward a place where church is seen as a place that exists to develop and nurture people's passions (or spiritual gifts)! To help us make that transition, last fall I introduced a spiritual gifts inventory into the life of the community. The assessment is an instrument that can help identify your passions. Once those passions are identified, it can help us find ways that you can connect with those passions within the context of our

One of the spiritual gifts most strongly represented in our community, for instance, is the gift of servant hood. Servant hood is "the gift of doing for others... both within and beyond the congregation and community." That gift was ranked first on 11 of the 26 inventories!

The individual gifts are then grouped together to form a big picture as well. This big picture gives us insights both into individuals and the personality of the church itself. Through the first 26 inventories, for instance, we've learned that the congregation's greatest overall strength is its commitment to outreach. 16 of the 26 inventories had this ranked as the strongest area. We've also learned that our greatest challenge is around organizing.

If you haven't already taken the spiritual gifts inventory, please do so. You can find copies of the inventory inside the back cover of the Joyful Noise songbook in the sanctuary as well as in the church office. The 5 minutes it takes to complete the inventory will help us follow the leading of the Spirit as we work to create a community that is driven primarily by your gifts and passions and not simply the needs of a bureaucracy.

Before beginning this review, I would like to remind everyone the library is in Smith Lounge and that there is a self service check-outbox. We ask that you renew the book you have out, after 3 weeks if you have not finished it, which is usually my case. The main reason for renewing it is that some books have been out for over a year and probably been lost amidst the borrower's own books. If we don't have your full name, address and phone number, which seems to be the case of those books we currently can't track down, especially when the borrower no longer attends church, there is no way of retrieving the book. Four people have worked on this collection for the last probably seven years, Marine Talent, Lila Aurich, Dorothy Hansen and myself not to mention a number of women in years gone by. We have weeded out the books that no longer nourish us intellectually, spiritually and communally. We have added many that do. YET the library has been rarely utilized for several years, in spite of monthly articles. Thus, I pose this question to all of you, is having such a library of any use or worth? Does this column solve any purpose, other than an opportunity for me to delve into a couple of books, which I enjoy, to glean some of the substance, that you might be interested in checking out what has been brought to your attention? As I do not drive, nor live nearby, I am unable to come in, clean up from all the groups that meet in Smith Lounge, and make the library section actually appear inviting. I decided to bring a few books over to the narthex and a sign -out box should be there, so you might want to peruse and check-out something you see there. I am asking that you, who attend WHCC regularly think about what can be done to make the Library a useful "tool" for us in extending our spiritual dialogue and action. There are already some wonderful book discussion groups within the church, however many are unable to attend them.

A number of years ago, we had a group that met for weeks after church to discuss Scott Peck's *A Different Drum*. Is there any interest in doing something like this again-after the post-service" greet and meeting time? Now to get to the book review (finally): *RECOVERING THE SOUL, A Scientific and Spiritual Search*, by Larry Dossey, M.D., one of my favorite thinkers. This is not a book new to our library. It was published in 1989, although purchased years later. Author of many mind/body/ spirit books, Dossey has been a practicing physician since his days in Viet Nam, and a leader in spiritual exploration for many years, especially in the intersections of science and spirituality, the subject of his books. Consider his preface: "Immortal...Here, there, everywhere, ...Extending to the farthest reaches of the cosmos..., Enveloping all minds and all persons...Timeless...beyond death... Existing at all moments, Including all of the past and all of the future... Forever and forever.... This is a por-

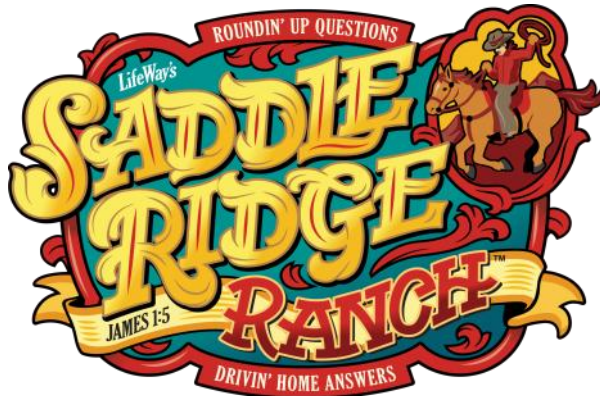

Into the Woods—Characters

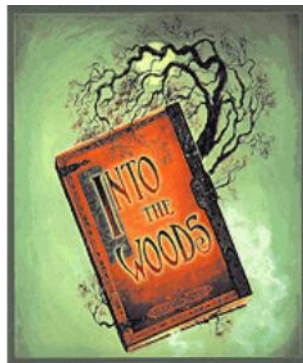
It is a mistake to look at fairy tales simply as “stories for children.” As Bruno Bettelheim pointed out, fairy tales are stories that pass on archetypal truths and are a way that we teach our children lessons about moral and ethical behavior. They also are coded messages about the process of growing up itself.

“Little Red Riding Hood,” one of the stories told in “Into the Woods,” tells a tale of a young girl growing up into a young woman, learning the hard way why her mother has told her never to stray from the path. When the wolf swallows her and granny she realizes that mother was not just trying to be overprotective but was truly trying to prepare her to face the dangers that await a young woman in the world. Little girls all need to learn how to deal with wolves.

“Jack and the Beanstalk” tells the story of a boy who needs to break away from his mother and discover himself. But Sondheim takes it beyond this to also make it a story of the consequences of greed and dishonesty.

“Cinderella” is a story that is found in many forms throughout the world. It, and sister-story “Rapunzel”, are also bugaboos for feminists because they both suggest that girls need to wait for princes to rescue them from their difficulties. Yet in both stories the good are ultimately rewarded for being good and the bad are punished.

Even the story made up by Sondheim and Lapine, “The Baker and His Wife,” tell us that difficult goals can be achieved by hard work, teamwork, persistence and good fortune.



The genius of “Into the Woods” is that the musical takes all the stories further, examining what “they lived happily ever after” really means. Can you kill a giant without consequences? Or a wolf? Are charming princes also faithful life-companions? Join us for a performance of “Into the Woods” and explore these ideas—although I promise you, you will also be wildly entertained. —Maria F. Barbee

Historical Snapshot



Members of the newly formed Woodland Hills Community Church congregation at one of the first meetings, May 1947. The Woodland Hills Church and Community Center was established in the mid-1940s by retired pastor Rev. Ellsworth Smith to provide a meeting place for local community organizations such as the Boy Scouts, Woodland Hills Chamber of Commerce and a church. In 1947, four lots at the corner of Dumetz Road and Canoga Avenue were purchased for this purpose. The land contained several former army barracks that were refurbished and used until the funds were raised for a permanent church and community center. In the early days of the church, the congregation would hold services outside. Incorporated in 1948, the Woodland Hills Community Church was the first church in the neighborhood of Woodland Hills.

It Happened In May

In 1947, Reverend Floyd S. Bailey became the first pastor of WHCC at a salary of \$3,000.00 per year (Pastor Craig, please note!). He held the first service of worship under the eucalyptus trees on the present site of the Church

on the 18th of May.

HAPPY BIRTHDAY WHCC! In addition, work started on the construction of the Sanctuary. Also in May of that year, the WHCC Women's Fellowship group was formed.
