



Cink designates funds from The Presidents Cup to Pregnancy Resource Center of Gwinnett

February 2010 - Atlanta-resident Stewart Cink, a six-time PGA TOUR event winner, including this year's British Open Championship, has recently designated a check in the amount of \$26,250 to the Pregnancy Resource Center of Gwinnett. This contribution is a portion of the charitable proceeds generated from The Presidents Cup 2009 at Harding Park Golf Course in San Francisco, California, in which Cink participated as a member of the victorious U.S. Team for the fourth time in his career.

The Presidents Cup is a unique golf event in that there is no purse or prize money. Players are not personally paid for their participation, but each competitor, captain and captain's assistant is allowed to allocate funds to chosen charitable causes. The Pregnancy Resource of Gwinnett (PRCG), a non-profit organization committed to the needs of women at risk of an unintentional or crisis pregnancy, with the full affirmation of the sanctity of human life, was Cink's choice of recipients for this honor. Cink, along with his wife, Lisa, have been long time friends and supporters of the PRCG and were the keynote speakers at the PRCG Gala Event in October 2009.

More than \$4.2 million was distributed to charitable causes from The Presidents Cup 2009, a record-tying amount for this prestigious competition and part of the nearly \$22 million raised since the inception of the event in 1994.

The Presidents Cup, a team match play competition featuring 24 of the world's top golfers -12 from the United States and 12 from around the world, excluding Europe - is held every two years, and since 1996 has alternated between the United States and international venues. This year, the U.S. Team retained the Cup from the Internationals in one of the most exciting and successful events to date.

About Stewart Cink in 2009: Stewart Cink posted his first top-10 of the season with a 1-up win over Ross Fisher in the third-place match at the World Golf Championships-Accenture Match Play Championship, holing a bunker shot at the 18th for victory. He tied for eighth at the Memorial Tournament, finishing 5-under for the tournament. He won his first career major professional championship at the British Open at Turnberry. He made a 12-foot birdie on the final hole of regulation and then took advantage of Tom Watson's missed opportunity in the four-hole playoff to win the game's oldest championship by six strokes. Cink recorded 1-1/2 points for the victorious U.S. Team at this year's Presidents Cup.
